SLACC is a project, co-funded by the European Commission within the program Erasmus+, which arises from the need to debunk the myths relating to climate change.

In recent years, significant strides have been made in understanding climate change, its causes, and consequences. However, there is a huge flow of misinformation aimed at confusing public opinion and generating doubts about the existence of climate change. Media and social media have become the vehicle of the main fake news but most young people are becoming increasingly aware of the climate crisis and consider the fight against climate change a crucial issue to address.

WHAT IS A CLIMATE MYTH?

Climate myths refer to popular misconceptions or distorted facts related to climate change, which mostly circulate the online space.

Climate myths can be either purposefully crafted fake news designed with the intent to mislead or simply false information spread on the internet without a clear recipient.

Climate myths can be especially dangerous to people lacking critical thinking skills who are not aware of existing fact-checking sites to use in order to debunk the misbeliefs with real facts.
